



Neighbors in Need UCC Special Mission Offering September 30 and October 1

The Neighbors in Need offering, which we will receive on World Communion Saturday and Sunday, September 30 and October 1, supports the UCC's ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to fund a wide array of local and national justice initiatives. advocacy efforts, and direct service projects. Working with members of the UCC Justice and Peace Action Network (a network of thousands of UCC justice and peace advocates), Justice and Witness continues its strong policy advocacy work on issues such as the federal budget, voting rights, immigration, health care, hate crimes, civil liberties, and environmental justice. Neighbors in Need also supports our American Indian neighbors in the UCC. One-third of the offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM). Historically, forebears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota, Nakota, Mandan, Hidatsa, Arickara, and Hocak in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, and northern Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. These churches and their pastors are supported by CAIM. CAIM is also an invaluable resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations in the U.S.

August 2023 ST. PETER'S UCC MISSIONS REPORT

WERF: WERF received 251 calls this month, over 100 more than last month.

The amounts clients requested from the Washington Emergency Relief seemed higher this month as well. Although we ran out of funds before the month was over, we were still able to give out 24 grants totaling \$5348.87. Eight were for electric, nine for rent, four for water and three for

fuel. We assisted a total of 56 community members.

The Harvest Table: The Harvest Table served 667 meals this August. Organizers

and volunteers assisted diners with food, clothing, special

needs, nursing care and wonderful fellowship.

Salam Free Clinic: The Salam Free Clinic had eight patients in August. Working

with the Harvest Table, which offered free haircuts from 8:00 to noon, more people were able to attend the Free Clinic. The Clinic hopes to host more events like this so we can be

available to more people who need health care.

St. Peter's United Church of Christ Church Council Meeting Highlights September 18, 2023

The proposed 2024 budget was presented.

- Church income is up this year over last but so are expenses, therefore the
 decision was made to freeze all salaries for 2024. It was noted that Cemetery
 and WERF may have salary increases, but they reimburse from their own funds.
- The Board intends to look at church insurance policies and try to lower the rate, as insurance is a large expenditure in our budget and it is expected to go up 10% next year if we make no changes.
- The Finance Board also made a proposal with regards to the Crowley CD interest. This money had \$40,000 earmarked for the homeless and the hungry. The Finance Board recommends that the interest from this portion of our budget goes to WERF, or is split between the food pantry, WERF, and the Harvest Table.
- A motion was made and seconded to approve the proposed 2024 budget and bring it to the Congregation for a vote. The motion passed.

Treasurer's Report:

The General Fund is currently behind by \$13,500.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the treasurer's report. The motion passed.

Senior Pastor's Report:

On March 1, 2024 the Grapevine Cluster is looking for a place to host a trivia night to benefit MoVal. It was suggested to offer them our facility at no charge.

It was noted that we need to set a date for the Fall Congregational Meeting. This was discussed and the meeting will be Saturday and Sunday, 28-29 October 2023.

Associate Pastor's Report:

- Programming is in full swing.
- We are still working on nursery coverage.
- The Rally weekend was very positive, with many good displays and good attendance. About 20 people participated on Saturday and 60 on Sunday.

Pastor Eric described a nonprofit that he started in 2016 to use music for social change. He is now doing more with this and is thinking about starting online gatherings and inperson gatherings. This is a separate ministry from St. Peter's. It will not use St. Peter's resources.

Boards and Committees:

Building and Grounds:

- A lot of work has been completed on the parking lot.
- Striping is happening tomorrow.
- The existing fire panel has a lot of areas in the building not covered and we may need a new one.

Cemetery Board:

- New section has been laid out.
- Cornerstone removal is in progress and most have been removed.
- Our new brochure has been completed.
- Cemetery budget for 2024 was handed out.

Worship Committee:

Still working on new paraments.

Christian Education:

- Working on finding a Christmas program.
- Looking for a local Trunk or Treat that St. Peter/s children could participate in.

Mission:

The Mission Committee is collecting items for hygiene kits.

Old Business:

Constitution Article Review and Perpetual Care of Cemetery:

Information gathering is still in process.

Website Update:

• A brief meeting was held at Rally Day. It was decided that we will meet with Pastor Eric to determine what we can do with the website, what can be changed, and how it is set up and programmed.

Meals on Wheels:

- There were no issues found with our insurance if Meals on Wheels were to be under our "umbrella" and use our EIN number.
- Jim motioned to approve allowing Meals on Wheels to use our EIN; Sue 2nd; motion passed.

New Business

Upstairs Kitchen Refrigerator:

• Byron noted that a larger refrigerator is needed upstairs to fit the communion trays. He offered to pay for this but wanted Council approval and thought we might be able to trade in the old one. The Council approved.

Printing of Hymns:

- It was noted that we are spending a lot of money and time to print the text of the hymns in the bulletins each week. Many people prefer to use the hymnal.
- However, not putting them in the bulletin could disadvantage those who watch the services online. There are 30-40 views per week on YouTube.
- This will be investigated further.


